## Polity 101—How MBC is Organized for Leadership: Biblical Eldership

**Text:** Various (primarily Acts 20:17-31; 1 Tim. 3:1-7; Tit. 1:5-9; 1 Pet. 5:1-4; Heb. 13:17; Mk. 10:42-45)

## Introduction:

When we talk about how a local church is organized, we are talking about its polity. Why are we organized as we are? There are five basic patterns of church government, as follows:

- 1. The Episcopalian system.
- 2. The Presbyterian system.
- 3. The Congregational system.
- 4. The "Non-government" system.
- **5.** The Biblical Eldership system. [What is followed at MBC.]

## **Body of Lesson:**

Five terms are used to describe biblical eldership and taken together they paint a fairly complete picture of the distinctive leadership at MBC:

- 1. **Pastoral leadership.** (1 Pet. 5:1-4) [Primary focus of the message last week.]
  - a. **Protecting the flock.** (Acts 20:17, 28-31a; Titus 1:5, 6a, 9)
  - b. **Feeding the flock.** (John 21:15-17; 1 Tim. 3:2; I Pet. 5:2)
  - c. **Leading the flock.** (2 Sam. 5:2; Psa. 78:70-72)
  - d. Helping to meet the flock's many practical needs. (Jam. 5:14; Acts 20:35)
- 2. Shared leadership.
- 3. **Male leadership.** (1 Tim. 2:8-3:7)
- 4. Qualified leadership. (1 Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1:5-9; 1 Pet. 5:2)
  - a. Moral and spiritual character
  - b. Abilities
  - c. Spirit-given motivation for the task
- 5. **Servant Leadership.** (Mark 10:42-45; John 13:1-17; 1 Pet. 5:3; cf. 3 John 9-10)
