Paul cites these verses as example of faith justification: God declares sinners like David to be righteous in his sight through their faith and will do the same for us (Rom. 4:4-8, 23-24).

<b>4</b> For day and night your hand was heavy on me; my strength was sapped as in the heat of summer.	2) Conviction of sin. God shows David his sin. For I know my transgressions, and my sin is always before me. Psalm 51:3
5 Then I acknowledged my sin to you and did not cover up my iniquity. I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the Lord." And you forgave the guilt of my sin. Selah.	3) David confesses his sin; 4) God forgives him. David said to Nathan, "I have sinned against the Lord." Nathan replied, "The Lord has taken away your sin. You are not going to die." 2 Sam. 12:13 If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. 1 John 1:9
<b>6</b> Therefore let all the faithful pray to you while you may be found; surely the rising of the mighty waters will not reach them.	5) David's charge to us. He encourages us to confess sin when God reveals it, not postpone. Seek the Lord while he may be found; call on him while he is near. Isaiah 55:6
<b>7</b> You are my hiding place; you will protect me from trouble and surround me with songs of deliverance. Selah.	6) Reconciliation. From having been his judge, God can now be David's refuge and his song. Let me hear joy and gladness; let the bones that you have broken rejoice. Psalm 51:8
8 I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my loving eye on you.	7) God will be David's teacher and guide as well. For the Lord gives wisdom; from his mouth come knowledge and understanding. Proverbs 2:6
<b>9</b> Do not be like the horse or the mule, which have no understanding but must be controlled by bit and bridle or they will not come to you.	8) God's admonition to David (and to us). Listen, my sons, to a father's instruction; pay attention and gain understanding. I give you sound learning, so do not forsake my teaching. Proverbs 4:1-2
<b>10</b> Many are the woes of the wicked, but the Lord's unfailing love [Heb. chesed—lovingkindness, covenant mercy, steadfast love] surrounds the one who trusts in him.	9) David's testimony to us. Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight. Proverbs 3:5-6
11 Rejoice in the Lord and be glad, you righteous; sing, all you who are upright in heart! Selah.	10) The psalm ends as it began, with David's joy in being forgiven, sharing his joy with us in this song. Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Philippians 4:4
